From the CEO

What first ignited your passion to serve in God's mission?

Emerging Leaders in Mission

How short-term mission changed the lives of two medical students.

Marisol

NICARAGUA

Midway through Marisol Cortez's junior year as an undergraduate medical student, she walked into a hospital room and saw a patient praying alone in bed. She thought about how God is at work when people feel most vulnerable. "A light bulb went off for me," she says. "I thought maybe I should try medical missions."

Her aunt recommended that Marisol talk with IM Area Director Adalia Gutiérrez-Lee about the work of AMOS Health and Hope in Nicaragua. AMOS works to reduce preventable deaths and improve health in communities suffering the unjust conditions of poverty.

After undergoing preparation with IM's Short-Term Mission staff, Marisol worked closely with AMOS and with Global Servant Christine Lafferty for nine weeks

last summer, creating public health education materials and experiencing home visits with AMOS teams.

In one case, a team traveled to the home of someone with an infected amputation after his brother had called to say he'd become unresponsive. "I had never seen a situation this dire before," Marisol says. The team checked his vitals and worked to get him up, while trying to contact an ambulance. When no ambulance came, they put the brothers into a taxi, a decision that saved the man's life. "I realized—if AMOS didn't have a doctor and these other resources to come check on patients, this patient most likely would have died."

Marisol was struck by the depth of care she saw AMOS doctors give, something she hopes to emulate. "It made me realize that the way I serve is through medicine—I want to serve in medical mission work. AMOS, the people, and the experience helped me realize that. Medicine is a way of loving people."

Emerging Leaders

As she continues her medical training, Marisol has applied to join an IM Emerging Leaders cohort. Through this new initiative at IM, she will build relationships with other like-minded young adults as they journey together in faith and in serving others.

All Emerging Leaders commit to participate in short-term mission. "Many of them have never traveled internationally, or have only traveled internationally for vacation," says IM Short-Term Mission Associate Nicole Cox, who leads the program. "This helps broaden their worldview as they serve others."

Alex

Like Marisol, Emerging Leader
Alexandra Bloss is a medical
student. When Alex began medical
school, she joined Emerging
Leaders in part because she
wanted to prioritize short-term
mission amid her busy schedule.
She began to ask God for wisdom
about where to go.

Then, as she drove to and from her school in Maine, Alex noticed a woman who stood every day on the median in the middle of the road, clutching a sign asking for money. One day, instead of driving past, Alex stopped. Over lunch, the woman shared the story of how she'd lost her housing. Alex realized that she wanted to spend more time learning from people impacted by poverty, trying to understand what could make a difference.

After a few Zoom meetings, Alex and IM Global Servant Paul Rollet agreed that in July 2023 Alex would travel halfway across the world and experience Paul and Queenie Rollet's ministry with Companion With The Poor (CWTP) in the Philippines.

"I'm task-oriented, and I'm thinking,
'What will I do?'" Alex says. "But Paul
said, 'This is more about being with
people. We will go, and we will spend
time with people."



As part of the trip, Alex spent four days immersed in a community experiencing poverty at a level that was beyond anything she had seen before, and she felt overwhelmed. "I wanted to tell Paul that I was done, but after dinner [my host family] read scripture and prayed together. After that I just said, 'Ok. I know that I am here for a reason. I'm supposed to trust God.'"

As Alex visited more communities, she met a young woman the same age as herself-23-who had wanted to become a teacher but who was instead caught in prostitution. Again, Alex was overwhelmed by the injustice of poverty. How could she, or anyone, respond?

"I have a lot to learn from the missionaries' approach," Alex says. "As they plant churches, they address the problems in the communities where they are—food, education, fresh water. They work with local leaders, then hand everything over to the leaders while maintaining relationships. They can't do everything, but as they walk alongside, they can do good. I think we would do well to learn that lesson."

Little Girl, Rise Up

In Iberoamerica and the Caribbean, a growing number of Talita Cumi Girls' Clubs create a safe place for girls to flourish.

As IM Regional Consultant Barbara Bolick worked among underserved communities in Chile to help form cooperatives for community health and economic development, the women of the community voiced a concern weighing on their minds. They wanted their daughters to have more opportunities than they'd had.

"We needed to do something to help their daughters overcome the challenges they face every day, to realize the purpose that God has for them in this world," Barb says.

Talita Cumi is the Aramaic phrase Jesus spoke in Mark 5, when he brought Jairus' daughter back to life: "Little girl, arise." In Chile, Barb's Talita Cumi Girls' Club taught girls everyday skills as well as the virtues of faith, hope, love, courage, moderation, justice, and wisdom. "We went from about 50 girls to about 150 girls," Barb says. The program received recognition from Chile's Ministry of Education when it was adopted a decade later by a local school.

Meanwhile, IM Area Director for Iberoamerica Rev. Dr. Adalia Gutiérrez-Lee had begun a conversation with Barb about whether the program and its benefits could be expanded throughout Latin America.

Talita Cumi Expands

Barb began the process of evaluating the program so it could be replicated—how was it working? Why was it working? In 2019, she assembled a consulting team to assess the curriculum and a team of Spanish speakers to evaluate the language used. During the pandemic, Barb and Global Servant Sarah Matos worked daily to complete a two-year curriculum, incorporating suggestions and contributions from the team.

In October 2021, assisted by Sarah Matos and the consulting team, Barb began to train in-country coordinators to lead year-long Talita Cumi pilot programs in the Dominican Republic, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Costa Rica, Mexico, and Ecuador. Local Christian women would lead the programs because, as Barb explains, "The only way to effectively nurture youth in vulnerable communities is to build mentoring skills in local leaders. Their cultural and contextual knowledge is irreplaceable."

In the Dominican Republic

In the Dominican Republic, IM Global Servant Ketly Pierre says, "Talita Cumi has been like the frosting on the cake for my life, the lives of the coordinators, mentors, and girls." There they have seven groups—four in the bateyes (communities surrounded by sugar cane) and three in La Romana.


During one meeting, Gabriela, a girl in the club, explained that she had no friends because her mother taught her that friends aren't real. "For her, Talita Cumi has become her family, where she has learned to show affection," Ketly says. "Our girls are coming to believe what [their mentor] Leydi always tells them, 'For me, life is beautiful, because God is in it.'"

In Mexico

In Mexico, a mentor shared with Global Servant Sarah Matos, "The girls are learning to make different decisions than the ones that their situations are leading them toward. The girls interact with one another differently now. They have learned to be true friends. They learn they are with others who want to make their life better. Our prayer is that God completely transforms their life story and that they have the spiritual and emotional strength to move forward."

In Nicaragua

As Regional Coordinator Sarah McCurdy (who is collaborating with Talita Cumi as a literacy consultant) visited a club in Nicaragua, she chatted with one girl just finishing her first year in the club. "She shared that a year ago she was angry, thought very low of herself, and didn't get along with her sister," Sarah says. "Now she is happier, enjoys being



with her family, and her self-esteem is much higher. She shared all of this with me with genuine joy."

In Costa Rica

In Costa Rica, as the pilot year ended and the group opened to new girls, it quickly doubled in size. Global Servant Sue Hegarty says, "Three mothers recently begged the mentor to accept their daughters into the program because they are desperate to have positive influences in their lives. Our mentors are women of great faith and courage, who love the girls in difficult situations."

Now the girls and their mothers are asking that the program continue into a third year, and the women leading the club are writing another year of curriculum. "The women in Costa Rica are leading this," Barb says. "I hope this becomes a grassroots movement from the context of the girls."

Life-Giving Partnerships

As Barb and Global Servant Ketly Pierre partner closely together to expand the program into more countries using the data collected from the pilot programs, IM donors are also finding creative ways in which to partner, in addition to giving directly to the project. The Rocky Mountains Region of American Baptist Churches recently gave a generous gift to provide nutrition support for all of the clubs in each country.

"We are so thankful for your generous gifts to this ministry," says Barb. "International Ministries comes from a long tradition of empowering women, and with your support, Talita Cumi helps young girls tell their story through the redemptive light of the gospel."





A Season for Everything

Through a difficult decision in a Colorado church, God brings new life.

"I noticed maybe fifteen years ago that our congregation was dwindling," says Rev. Don Lambert, a former pastor of American Baptist Church Fort Collins in Colorado.

Some people had left for other churches. Others were no longer able to attend. The flow, which felt shocking at first, continued—members decreased, finances decreased, and, the biggest tipping point of all, those available to help with the work of the church's ministries decreased.

"I was tired," says Fran Lambert, Don's wife, reflecting on the additional work she and other members were taking on in order to keep the church functioning.

"We reached a critical point in the last five years—we kept going but recognized that people were burned out," says church board member Bill Moseley.

Bill began to reflect on the situation with other board members. "Churches don't live forever. I don't think any of the churches Paul planted still exist. We recognized that a church has a life span. It's ok to admit that maybe it is time for something new."

When they began to see this decline, the congregation had the foresight to change their by-laws, stating their intent to close before all their resources were fully depleted, so that they could give away a useful, sizeable gift for the missions and ministries the church historically supported. In January 2023, the congregation voted in unanimous agreement to close.

"There was much sadness in letting go of regular worship together and a physical place in which to worship, but we also recognized that for everything, including churches, there is a time, and ours had run its course," says Terry Myers, Bill's sister and a former IM global servant to Bulgaria.

After the congregation sold the building, they found themselves in an incredible situation—they now had \$1.3 million to invest in the ministries that had meant the most to their church.

The congregation decided to give the money to ministries that had been the most historically significant to them—a ministry the church founded for day care for the elderly and International Ministries. A part of the money was also allocated to assist local ministries.

ABC Fort Collins had a long history with IM, which began even before the church's inception in 1954. The church's first full-time pastor, Rev. Dr. Fred Chambers and his wife, Dr. Dorothy Chambers, were missionaries in India and the Philippines, and they helped to instill a love for mission in the church. The congregation supported the ministry of its long-time member Marion Beebe in Burma, as well as of former Global Servants Terry and Tom Myers in Bulgaria. Up to their final moments, the church continued to support other IM global servants as well.

"With this history in mind, it was an easy decision for us to commit to give 40 percent of our remaining assets to International Ministries to help IM continue God's mission and ministries into the future," says Bill. The board wanted to give the funds to IM without strings attached so that IM would be free to use them where the needs were

greatest. They sought counsel from IM's Major Gifts Officer Ray Schooler, then voted to divide their gift between four different ministries with the most urgent needs.

"IM is so deeply moved by the thoughtful manner in which ABC Fort Collins remembered and funded our ministries with this generous closing gift," Ray says. "It's a gift that represents what mattered most to them."

In June 2023, the church held its final service, creating space for members to grieve together, and in September 2023, the sale closed and a new bilingual church moved into the space.

"It was a bittersweet journey," Terry reflects.

"We felt the loss of being with our church family, but there is also joy that a new, young, and energetic congregation will be using the building. And we rejoice in the lasting contribution we can make in memory of those who came before us by giving to the causes that have been vital to the ministry of our church."

Empowering People Where They Are

In Zimbabwe, International Associate Global Servants Chrissy and Lance Muteyo find new ways to bring change.

"Just as communities are the sources of problems, the community also possesses the resources to find solutions," says IM International Associate Global Servant Lance Muteyo. "Even amid violence, you can work toward peace."

With a background in sociology, the arts, and family therapy, Lance has found creative ways to engage in activism, beginning in his neighborhood in Zimbabwe, a country experiencing crippling inflation, unemployment, and poor infrastructure. He mobilized artists to help promote home-based care programs for those with HIV and AIDS who had no access to treatments. He organized cleanup campaigns and the drilling of wells for clean drinking water to fight Harare's cholera outbreaks.

In 2009, Lance attended a global Baptist peace conference in Rome, where he met former IM Global Consultant Dan Buttry. Later, both Lance and his wife, IM International Associate Global Servant Chrissy Muteyo, would complete formal training programs in Conflict Transformation Training with Dan and his wife, Sharon, and become trainers themselves.

Lance's influence and impact expanded as he founded Trees of Peace Africa (TOP Africa) in Zimbabwe as well as the Pan African Peace Network in Kenya. In the last fifteen years he has facilitated peacebuilding trainings for thousands of leaders in churches, nonprofits, schools, and businesses in fourteen countries. In 2019, TOP Africa became an official IM partner, and Chrissy and Lance became global servants.





Building Peace Throughout Zimbabwe's Provinces

Last spring, Lance led a "Developing Community through Peacebuilding" event in Harare, Zimbabwe, to build unity among community leaders from different ethnic, religious, and cultural backgrounds.

"In addition to Zimbabwe's political, social, and economic challenges, Zimbabwe is a polarized country," Lance explains. "Some leaders have engaged in efforts to bring about change non-violently, or participated in mediation between warring groups, however, these courageous leaders typically have little or no training for such activities. Therefore, there is an important need for training."

Lance has taken and further developed the "bottom-up" peacebuilding methodology he learned from the Buttrys, which emphasizes the cooperative power people can hold to promote peace within their own communities, rather than a top-down approach in which a government or another authority imposes peace. "It is a good methodology—in our context people are always silenced," Lance says. "This methodology lets people talk. It lets them practice—how to be a facilitator, how to solve a problem. At the end of the day, we want people to own the peacebuilding process."

Empowering Women

In 2021, Chrissy began a new life-changing project in Zimbabwe specifically for women. She had watched many women bear the brunt of economic hardship; they are vulnerable to domestic abuse as well as labor exploitation.

Chrissy, who is a gifted family therapist as well as an experienced seamstress, began a tailoring program to equip vulnerable women with income-generating skills. This program teaches basic and advanced sewing, clothing design, dress making, and business skills development, alongside biblical methods of peace and conflict transformation. Chrissy also provides opportunities for women who wish to do so to receive trauma counseling.

"My husband passed away while I was pregnant with our third child," one participant explains. "A life of a widow is difficult, and I have experienced exploitation and humiliation. My son is now six, and all these years I have been working hard with no proper skills. [Then] I heard about the tailoring program. I was

the best student in our morning session group. I am now working at home making clothes and school uniforms. I have a good customer base and am now able to look after my kids."

Chrissy says, "What's making me happy is that we are doing something. In my community, I can make a change. We are experiencing success in what we are doing with tailoring. We are empowering women to fend for their families."

A Request for Prayer

As Lance and Chrissy walk alongside others to train them in building the kind of peace that ultimately helps all to flourish, Lance asks, "Will you pray with us? We believe the things we are doing here have a huge impact. But we are at our capacity point. We are praying that God will provide a way to do more—we want to empower more people where they are."

Global Mission Overview



Our God is igniting a passion for mission in his people, and International Ministries (IM) is privileged to respond by facilitating the engagement of the people of God in the mission of God around the globe through sending and sustaining personnel, accompanying and collaborating with partners, and implementing programs and projects.

People

IM's "member care" for global servants aims to enable them to serve with long-term resilience and effectiveness. Global servants attend a "Conference for Missionaries" (CFM) every four or five years for a time of spiritual formation and soul care. Twenty-two global servants participated in a Fall 2022 CFM on the Outer Banks of North Carolina, and another twenty-seven global servants—along with twenty-two missionary kids (MKs)—gathered for a Summer 2023 CFM at Silver Bay, New York.

Partners

Through the pandemic and other recent crises, IM has collaborated with our international partners to meet immediate need and prepare for long-



term recovery. We have partnered with Hungarian Baptist Aid to minister to persons displaced by the war in Ukraine. In partnership with Baptist World Alliance Aid, we have facilitated relationship-building and support for partners in Haiti. In South and East Asia, IM worked with the North East Christian University to provide a program in Christian Enterprise Social Development, which has equipped over 400 pastors and Christian leaders to establish faithbased enterprises to support ministry.

At the 2023 gathering of the Baptist World Alliance, IM joined other Baptist mission organizations as a founding partner in a Baptist Global Mission Network, which will facilitate collaboration of mission agencies, missiologists, and mission pastors in cross-cultural mission. IM is also honored that our Executive Director and CEO Sharon Koh and Global Servant Melanie Baggao were invited to be delegates to the Fourth Lausanne Congress on World Evangelization in Seoul, South Korea, in September 2024.

Programs and Projects

In 2023, IM's Short-Term Mission program resumed sending teams and individual volunteers. This last year, 208 volunteers served in Thailand, Japan, Nicaragua, Mexico, Nepal,



volunteers served in short-term mission.

Kenya, Ethiopia, Hungary, Dominican Republic, India, Liberia, Costa Rica, Bangladesh, the Netherlands, Norway, and Colombia. Short-Term Mission also continued offering virtual "Mission Express" experiences, with online trips during the 2022-23 fiscal year to South Africa, Liberia, Lebanon, Hungary, Myanmar, Nepal, Cambodia, and Israel/Palestine.

IM's new Emerging Leaders young adult discipleship program continues to grow; cohort members attended the Urbana '22 Student Missions Conference and the ABCUSA Biennial Mission Summit.

Through IM's stewardship of One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) Development Grants, American Baptist Foundation Palmer Grants, and Lipphard Grants for Medical Mission, over \$600,000 was provided for projects, including construction of schools, leadership training, prevention of human trafficking, and education of refugee children.

Global Peacebuilding

Among the life-changing initiatives your giving has helped to fund this year is the Global Peacemakers Mentoring Fund. This project supports workshops led by local peacemakers that equip church and community leaders with conflict transformation and peacebuilding skills. In Kenya, International Associate Global Servant Boaz Keibarak engages in this work, as do International Associate Global Servants Chrissy and Lance Mutevo in Zimbabwe.

In southwestern Nairobi, IM partner Peacebuilding, Healing, and Reconciliation Program (PHARP) is facilitating and leading peacebuilding training in Kibera, a low-income area where over 2 million people live within one square mile without the infrastructure of running water, sewage, and, in some homes, electricity. PHARP's peacebuilding work in Kibera over the last five years has resulted in a direct decrease in conflict and an increase in community empowerment. Project leader Pelagie Gichanga says,

"We have seen openness from all the participants. Critical issues like injustices that certain tribes face were openly talked about in a safe environment. Pastors were able to shake hands as a symbol of forgiveness and reconciliation and agreed to work together to fight against enmity amongst clergy. The people in Kibera are motivated to acquire valuable skills in conflict resolution. It brings us great joy to continually equip them with necessary tools and knowledge in the area."



Strengthening Local Leaders In Nepal

Since 1993, when Baptist churches in Nepal formed a national organization (the Nepal Baptist Church Council or NBCC), the number of churches has grown from 8 to 265, with an additional 224 local fellowships that have not yet been formally recognized as churches.

As NBCC has grown, it has invited partners from Korea, Malaysia, India, and the West to come alongside local leaders as they develop contextually appropriate ways of embodying God's love for the people of Nepal. "International Ministries has focused on helping NBCC increase its capacity to train church leaders and to respond to human needs with health, disaster relief, and development ministries," says IM Global Consultant for Theological Education Stan Slade.

"To help meet the rising need for church leaders, IM has given special attention to strengthening the work of Nepal Baptist College (NBC), the educational arm of NBCC."

The college offers both church-based and campus-based diplomas, bachelor's, and master's programs. Thank you for helping to equip leaders for effective service as church leaders, evangelists, Bible translators, theological educators, and developments workers.

Encouraging Our Friends in Norway

In July 2023, Area Director Rev.
Dr. Charles Jones visited Europe's
northernmost Baptist church in
Honningsvåg, Norway, with Rev.
Rob Kirbach, Associate Executive
Minister for the American Baptist
Great Rivers Region.

During World War II, Germany occupied Norway. When the German army retreated, they applied a scorched earth strategy, razing an area larger than Denmark. In 1955, as a part of reconstruction efforts, the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society (now International Ministries) provided funding for the reconstruction of a fisherman's hostel in Honningsvåg to restore the

livelihood and dignity of the local fishing community. IM later also supported the Norwegian evangelist who planted the church, which met in the hostel. Previous IM Area Director Reid Trulson had visited the church in 2002.

Thank you for the ways in which your support this year enabled IM to maintain its commitment to join alongside our brothers and sisters in the gospel as they invite others to follow Jesus Christ and receive God's kingdom on earth as it is in heaven.

Serving Haitians

As the situation in Haiti has grown more volatile, our global servants initially planning to serve in Haiti are now ministering among Haitians in the Dominican Republic. They support our Dominican partners, who are welcoming Haitians and helping them adjust and flourish there.

Global Servants Kihomi Ngwemi and Nzunga Mabudiga recently relocated from Haiti to serve a community with a large Haitian population. A local association of churches had been praying for God to send someone to aid them in this ministry, and they have since provided land for Kihomi and Nzunga to plant a Creolespeaking church. In September 2023, the church began meeting as many as three times a week because of the hunger for a church in this community. Global Servants Brian and Lynette Smith, who were also previously serving in Haiti, are currently helping the River of Life Baptist Church rebuild after a devastating fire as they minister to Dominicans and Haitians working on farms and in cacao fields. Soon Global Servants Tim and Stacy Reese will join

our team of global servants ministering among the diaspora populations.

Thank you to all who support our global servants, and also those have given funds toward Creole hymnals and Bibles for this rapidly growing church. In the midst of turmoil, the gospel continues to be preached in both words and deeds.

Therapeutic Care for Trauma Survivors

For the last twenty years, Global Servant Kit Ripley has been providing care for adolescent tribal minority girls who are survivors of trauma, including sexual abuse, domestic violence, and trafficking in persons through her work with the New Life Center in Chiang Mai, Thailand.

The New Life Center offers a residential shelter, education, life skills training, and trauma-informed care and counseling. It is also active in implementing antitrafficking campaigns that have reached more than 110,000 people throughout the Mekong subregion, including Thailand, Burma (Myanmar), Lao PDR, and southern China.

Kit's primary ministry is with Imago Art Studio, an outreach of the New Life Center. In addition to providing clinical counseling and art therapy for NLC residents, Kit is providing workshops throughout the community on traumainformed care, art therapy, counseling, conflict transformation, and spiritual formation.

"Thank you for your prayers and financial support, which makes all of these things possible," Kit says.





Speaking of going over and above... I remember visiting with one couple with whom I have become very close friends. They have been supporting IM (and many other ministries) for more years than I have been in ministry myself!

During our conversation, they expressed a need to update their estate plan. But they had no one whom they knew or trusted for such important counsel. Having worked in the field for several years, I offered the names of some trustworthy Christian attorneys in their area. They found one they liked and, after a few visits, decided to create a plan to benefit all their favorite ministries, including IM.

Each of the people I mentioned here is establishing a legacy of one kind or another. Their gifts will continue to change lives well into the future. We thank every one of you who have similarly laid up treasures in heaven through your generous giving to International Ministries.


