Where Hardship and Hope Meet: A Reflection from Our Executive Director / CEO

Some of the most powerful moments in ministry happen where hardship and hope meet. The opening verses of Isaiah 61 are a remarkable example. Isaiah wrote to people who had experienced loss and devastation and their future seemed uncertain. Yet God delivered a message of good news and hope: “They will rebuild the ancient ruins and restore the places long devastated; they will renew the ruined cities that have been devastated for generations.”

This picture of God’s restorative work is at the heart of IM’s mission. Around the world, global servants and ministry partners are helping to rebuild, restore and renew lives and communities in Christ’s name.

The ministry of Anita and Rick Gutierrez offers us a beautiful example. As family physicians serving in South Africa, their work is deeply rooted in education and healing. They train local women and men to become health builders. Health builders address lifestyle-related diseases in their own communities, expanding access to much-needed preventative care. Through innovative videos, health screenings, and practical assessments, they equip people with knowledge and tools that continue making an impact long after a training ends.

Yet their ministry extends beyond physical health. Anita and Rick understand that restoration is holistic. Today, their ministry also includes training health builders in gardening, fruit tree propagation and poultry-raising skills. They foster relationships through Bible studies and community projects. Through this integrated approach, people experience improved nutrition, economic opportunities, and spiritual growth.

This kind of transformation echoes the promises in Isaiah. With the leading of God’s Spirit, Anita and Rick are rebuilding capacity in local communities, restoring access to healthy foods and renewing lives through practical and spiritual care.

Throughout these resources, you’ll encounter stories and biblical reflections that remind us that God’s mission is not abstract. God is at work through global servants and IM partners as they educate, heal and restore lives in the communities they serve.

And it is your prayers, financial support and encouragement that make it possible for global servants like the Gutierrezes to remain faithfully present with the people they serve. Thank you for being part of this work!

IM does not ask global servants to raise all of the funds they need but comes alongside them in financial support as well as in ministry. When personalized funding falls short, WMO gifts fill the gap and keep global servants in their country of service. WMO gifts support global servants with training and pastoral care, enable us to address crises when they arise, and so much more. Sunday School Lesson

MAIN THEME:

God sees beauty, gifts and hope in people and places all around the world! Sometimes we only see problems, but God can see what can grow from difficulties. Global servants join in God's work by helping people learn and by bringing healing to those who are sick. They use the gifts God has given them to show love to others. You can be a part of that too!

LESSON

1] Hold up an acorn (or show a picture). Ask, "What do you see?"
Allow for answers, but bring attention to how small it is and how ordinary it looks. Have them hold it in their hand.

2] Now show a picture of a large oak tree. Ask, "What do you see now?"
Emphasize how the giant tree started as a tiny acorn. When we look at an acorn or hold it in our hand, we might only see something small. But God can already see the big, strong tree that will grow from it.

Talk about how life can be like that, too. We might see problems or can be sad or disappointed. But God is really great at seeing what is inside of us—like gifts, and strengths—that can grow and help us to overcome difficult times.

3] Read Isaiah 61:1-4: When Isaiah wrote these words, God's people were feeling discouraged. Their city had been ruined. They felt sad and hopeless. But God gave them a promise. God said that He would bring comfort instead of sadness, joy instead of sorrow, and hope instead of despair. It says that God's people would become great trees that show God's goodness (International Children's Bible)!

Just like God sees a mighty tree in a tiny acorn, God saw hope and a good future for His people when others only saw hard times.

4] God wants to give us hope! Ask, "Can you think of Bible stories where God brought hope to people in hard times?"
Possible answers could be: God providing manna and water in the desert, David defeating Goliath, Jesus healing the sick or feeding the hungry crowds, Jesus raising Lazarus, and Jesus forgiving our sins.

Explain: Over and over, God saw hope and possibilities where other people saw hardship.

5] Show the picture of Global Servants Anita and Rick Gutierrez. Just like those stories from the Bible, God brings hope to us and to others around the world. Let me tell you about some people serving God in another part of the world.

Anita and Rick Gutierrez serve in South Africa (show map). They are doctors who help people learn how to be healthy and care for their families. They also teach people new skills in farming so that they can have a better, healthier future.

They do more than just treat illness and teach skills. They look for the gifts and abilities God has already placed inside people. Just as God sees a tree inside an acorn, Anita and Rick look for the potential God has placed inside each person.

6] Ask, "What are some gifts or abilities God gives people?"

Guide answers to things like kindness, helping, music, leadership, farming, building, creativity, etc.

7] Show the pictures of global servants working/serving people. Global servants like Anita and Rick use their own gifts to help others. But they also help others discover and use the gifts God has given them! For example, Anita and Rick teach people about health. Then those people go out and teach their family members and others in their own community!

This is how God's work of hope keeps growing. Around the world, people use their gifts in different ways. Some people use their gifts to teach. Some grow food. Some care for the sick. Some build things. Some lead churches.

But no matter what, God uses all kinds of people in all kinds of places to bring hope.

8] Bring it together: Remember the acorn? God saw a mighty tree.

Remember God's people in Isaiah? God saw hope and healing?

And Anita and Rick? They use the gifts God has given them to help others learn and grow. They help people discover the gifts God has already planted inside them, too.

And God sees those same possibilities in you.

9] Ask, "What gift has God given you that could help someone else?"
Allow the kids to answer and affirm responses as amazing possibilities.

Just like an acorn becomes a mighty oak tree, God can use the gifts he has given you in amazing ways. And just like Anita and Rick, God may one day invite you to use those gifts to serve people in another part of the world!

OBJECTS NEEDED

- Pictures of Anita and Rick Gutierrez or other IM global servants that your church supports (IM's downloadable prayer cards are a great resource for this)
- Pictures of the global servants "in action" serving different people and communities.
- Picture of an acorn or flower seed. (Or a real one!)
- Picture of a large oak tree or a beautiful flower.
- Optional: A map to show the location of missionaries

CLOSING PRAYER

Lord, thank you for seeing hope and possibility in every person and every place. Help us to see others the way you do. Thank you for the gifts you have planted in each of us. Help those gifts grow so we can be trees of goodness that share your love with others. Thank you for global servants who are helping people learn, heal and grow around the world. Give them strength and joy as they serve. Amen.

Biblical Reflections

1 BEAUTY FROM ASHES: EDUCATE

Isaiah 61:1–4 invites us to see the tender heart of God for a wounded world. The prophet speaks of the One anointed by the Spirit, sent to bring good news to the poor, bind up the brokenhearted, proclaim liberty to captives, and comfort those who mourn.

These are not distant words. They reveal the character of God: merciful, attentive, and compassionate. As Christians, we hear in this passage the voice and mission of Jesus, who came near to the hurting and offered healing, dignity, and hope.

Education is one of the many ways God brings this kind of restoration to people and communities. International Ministries' global servants and ministry partners equip people all over the world with knowledge and skills. Yet, education is not simply the transfer of information or methods; it is an investment in people whose hearts are being shaped by the love and compassion of Christ. When leaders are trained to listen well, serve humbly, pray faithfully, and respond wisely, they become vessels of God's grace to their congregations and communities alike.

This vision is at the heart of the Master of Theological Studies Latino/a degree program, which trains leaders throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. For the last 10 years, IM has collaborated with Palmer Seminary to provide an online program, fully taught in Spanish, and financially affordable and accessible to ministry partners in their own countries. Students receive holistic training that equips them to address the spiritual, emotional and social needs of their own communities.

Through the Talita Cumi Girls' Club, we see that education is not limited to formal classrooms or degree programs. Here, faithful mentors invest in young girls as they disciple, encourage, and guide. Many girls come carrying hidden pain. Through Scripture, friendship, and compassionate care, girls begin to discover that they are deeply loved by God. Little by little, ashes give way to beauty, mourning gives way to comfort, and fear gives way to hope. This is the restorative work of God.

We see this same holistic, restorative vision at work in South Africa through the ministry of Global Servants Anita and Rick Gutierrez. Drawing on their background in family medicine, they train local "health builders" who address lifestyle-related

diseases out in their own communities. Health builders also receive education in nutrition, gardening, poultry-raising skills, and fruit tree propagation. Equipped with practical knowledge and a desire to serve others, they are able to teach others. This creates new opportunities for healthier families and stronger communities.

Isaiah reminds us that those whom God restores will rebuild what has been broken. Through education, leaders, mentors, young girls, and health builders are nurtured, equipped and empowered to become a blessing for others.

May God continue to minister to and through each of us, creating a ripple effect of restoration from one life and one generation to the next.



Biblical Reflections

2 | BEAUTY FROM ASHES: HEAL

Isaiah 61:1, CEV reads: “The Spirit of the LORD God has taken control of me! The LORD has chosen and sent me to tell the oppressed the good news, to heal the brokenhearted, and to announce freedom for prisoners and captives.”

For most of my adult life, I interpreted “heal the brokenhearted” as emotional comfort for those who are sad or mourning. However, hearing the stories of our brothers and sisters in South Asia has opened my eyes to a richer meaning. In places where medical care is unavailable or economically inaccessible, serious illnesses are heartbreaking and tragic. Simple infections can become deadly.

This was also the situation in the time of Jesus. In the Gospels, Jesus heals many. Most were common people, like daily laborers or farmers, who would not have been able to afford doctors. Luke writes, “After the sun had set, people with all kinds of diseases were brought to Jesus. He put his hands on each one of them and healed them” (4:40). We perceive them as crowds, but each person had an identity and a story.

Luke does not share these details, but we can imagine them: a man no longer able to work in the fields; a woman unable to care for her children; an only son who represented hope for his parents and their future. Their illnesses had a heartbreaking impact on their families. Jesus healed all of them with a touch, restoring them to community, to family and to life.

Today, IM partners and global servants continue the healing ministry of Jesus. Anita and Rick Gutierrez train and equip “health builders” in South Africa. They combat lifestyle-related diseases like HIV/AIDS, high blood pressure, heart and artery disease, diabetes, and malaria. In South Asia, doctors and nurses set up medical clinics to provide care in remote areas. Many locations are a day’s walk, or more, from the nearest hospital. Christians pray for healing in Jesus’ name and rejoice as they see neighbors restored from the verge of death to strength and vitality. In places hostile to Christianity, pastors have been arrested for praying like this. But in faith, they continue to do so.

Emotional and psychological healing are also key parts of the ministry of IM global servants and partners. Kit Ripley serves with Cornerstone Counseling Foundation. She provides clinical mental health counseling and art therapy for Thai and tribal survivors of trauma. Mylinda Baits works with servant leaders and those who do the hard work of rescue, relief, and restoration. She creates spaces where they can be nurtured and renewed.

The healing work of Jesus continues through IM global servants, partners, and volunteers. Their work is giving people a future with hope and healing the brokenhearted. From the ashes of emotional, psychological, and physical illness, lives are changed, and beautiful new lives spring forth.

BEAUTY FROM ASHES: RESTORE

Read Isaiah 61:1-4.

We recognize these words from the prophet Isaiah as those read by Jesus in the synagogue in Nazareth, early in his ministry. It was this passage that Jesus declared to be his mission statement. Restoration is the work of the kingdom of God. When the Spirit of God is at work, we see restoration. It can be through the work of healing or liberation, or in ministry to individuals or with communities.

Ultimately, Jesus comes not just to restore things to the way they were, but to how they were created to be. On the day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit was poured out on the church. As followers of Christ in all generations since, we are called and empowered to follow Jesus into his mission of restoration.

Throughout the history of global mission, we've heard countless stories of people in hopeless situations. Yet they have experienced the kind of liberation and healing that leads to restoration of life, dignity, agency and influence.

This restoration takes many forms: a victim of human trafficking finding freedom and livelihood; a community using sustainable farming to improve the physical and economic health of all who live there; or raising up leaders who share the Good News of Jesus Christ, establishing church communities and making an impact on lives and neighborhoods around the world.

Restoration can involve entering into places of conflict to train others to work together for lasting peace—even among people who have hated one another for generations. Or it may include helping displaced individuals and families build new homes and thrive after being forced to leave their homeland due to danger, violence, war or destruction.

In all these ways and more, we have seen God at work through the people of IM and international partners. They are pursuing the work of restoration found in the mission of Jesus Christ. It is particularly evident that this work of restoration is of the Holy Spirit—we see it through the joy in the lives of those involved in the most seemingly hopeless work. It is evident in their work's creativity and innovation, and it is evident in the changed lives and communities.

God's work of restoration will continue through generations as restored people become those who do the work of restoration.



Questions For Biblical Reflection

EDUCATE

- 1) Isaiah 61 reflects God's promises for restoration. Often, God uses people—teachers, mentors, pastors, even friends and family—to help bring that restoration into the lives of others.

Who has God used to encourage your growth and faith? How has their investment shaped your life and reflected God's restoring work?

- 2) Education is more than a transfer of knowledge. It is one way God equips people to serve others and participate in the work of restoration. The people serving in the highlighted ministries train leaders, mentor young girls and equip health builders, so they can then go out and strengthen their communities.

What knowledge, skills, experiences or gifts has God given you that could encourage or equip others? Where might God be inviting you to invest in someone else's growth?

- 3) Isaiah reminds us that those whom God restores will help rebuild what has been broken. Through education, mentoring, and discipleship, people are equipped to bring hope and healing to future generations.

What unique role does education play in making transformation sustainable and generational? Where do you see a need for restoration in your community, church, or relationships, and how might God be calling you to participate in the work of restoration in that area?

HEAL

- 1] Isaiah 61 speaks of healing the brokenhearted. Many people think of brokenheartedness as emotional pain like sadness or grief, but it can also be the result of physical illness, trauma, and suffering.

How does this broader understanding of "the brokenhearted" change the way you read Isaiah 61? What kinds of brokenness do you think God is especially calling the Church to notice and respond to today?

- 2] In Luke 4:40, people with all kinds of diseases came to Jesus for healing. Although Luke describes a crowd, each person had a unique story, struggle, and hope for the future. Jesus responded with compassion, caring for the whole person and restoring them to family, community, and life.

How does Jesus' example challenge the way you see those who are hurting? Think of someone in your life who may be carrying a hidden burden. How might God be inviting you to offer compassion, encouragement, practical support, or prayer?

- 3] God's mission from Isaiah 61 is to bring good news, freedom, and healing to the brokenhearted. IM global servants and partners continue the healing ministry of Jesus through medical care, trauma recovery, community health training and faithful prayer.

Where do you see God bringing healing and restoration in your church, community, or in the world today? Who are the people in your life engaged in this kind of healing work, and how can you support, encourage, and pray for them?

RESTORE

- 1] In Leviticus 25, God instructed Israel to observe a Year of Jubilee, also known as the Year of the Lord's Favor, every 50 years. It was a year to rest the land, forgive debt, and liberate the slaves. Isaiah 61 points to a future fulfillment of these promises, and in Luke 4:16–21, Jesus declares that he is the one who will fulfill them.

How did Jesus demonstrate restoration, and where do you see themes of rest, forgiveness and liberation in his ministry? How do these themes connect to the ministry or role God has called you into?

- 2] Throughout his ministry, he sought out those whom society had cast aside, restoring them physically and spiritually. This is the same work the Holy Spirit continues to do through global servants. It is also what the Spirit is calling you to do.

As you look around your life, who is the Holy Spirit calling to you to come alongside and minister to? Where is the Lord trying to use you, but you have been hesitant to respond?

- 3] Isaiah 61 was a message of hope for the Israelites returning from captivity to a city in ruins. God promised that he was not done with them, nor had he forgotten them. It was a promise of restoration. Before we enter the work of restoration, let's examine our own hearts.

What part of your life do you need to let the Holy Spirit restore? Is there a sin, broken relationship, wound, or place of weariness? Take a moment to ask God to reveal what needs to be restored in your life. Be reminded that it is the same God who promised restoration to Israel and fulfilled it in Jesus, who is faithful to restore you as well.
